Program Updates: Coordinated Entry







Lyric and SVDP staff at the Project Homeless Connect Event.

- Project Homeless Connect event on May 10th:
 - St. Vincent de Paul and Lyric staff engaged with 35 clients.
- Rapid re-housing for survivors: 17 of 38 slots have been filled.
 - Referrals made through victim service providers and Coordinated Entry.
 - 12-24 months of rental assistance and services.
- **→**Bayview Navigation Center **Multi-Disciplinary Team**:
 - 33 guests became known to CE.
 - 36 guests enrolled in rapid re-housing.
 - 5 guests enrolled in IHSS.
 - 3 guests enrolled in nursing-supported PSH.

Coordinated Entry & Housing Demographics






Race is incomplete for 6% of clients (3% Data Not Collected; 3% Doesn't Know / Refused)



Ethnicity is incomplete for 2% of clients (1% Data Not Collected; 1% Doesn't Know / Refused)






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
Coordinated Entry & Housing Demographics







Program Updates: Housing

Housing Quality Work:

- ► Rolling out **elevator repair funds** for buildings owned by private landlords and master leased by nonprofits.
- **→\$5** million in capital repairs will be available in early FY2023-24.
- **→**Started Housing Quality Standards inspections in local portfolio in FY 2023-24.
- Investments in FY2022-24 budget in wage increases to improve property management.




- →Approved to apply for Homekey funding.

Housing Vacancies



- 108 vacant units in buildings in lease up at City Gardens and the National (post-fire) not included in inventory or vacancy percentage.

Reducing Vacancies to Goal Rate of 7%

- ► Budget investments in **property management** for quicker unit turnover and higher unit quality.
- Housing Placement team created (includes staff dedicated to transfers).
- ► Institute updated protocols for unit refusals and participation, coupled with increase in referrals.
- → Pilot a direct placement program in partnership with HSOC.
- → Pilot a **referral pipeline** for clients who are "engaged" and have high level of documentation, including unsheltered people.
- ← Continue to refine pre-referral review process, including CoC eligibility.
- Expand document-readiness role of shelter case managers.
- → Revise approach to RA/ADA to accommodate clients with the highest needs.
- Implement monthly review of vacancies from provider reports to improve data quality and inform work.



ONE System and Unit-Level Inventory

- →Improved vacancy tracking will be available this summer once HSH inventory is added to the Online Navigation and Entry (ONE) System:
 - ONE System is HSH's HUD-mandated Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
 - All site-based PSH will be live in ONE in June 2023.
 - Vacancy tracker will be "under construction" in June.
- **Continued work**: add shelter bed inventory, referral functionality, information on evictions, and additional reporting/monitoring tools.



Evictions in Permanent Supportive Housing

- Tenants in CoC-funded PSH in San Francisco have a 97% year-over-year stability rate, and after two years in PSH, 87% of tenants remain stably housed, exceeding the national average of 80%.
- ← 2022: 142 evictions out of 10,978 households (1.29%) at 146 sites.
- HSH Annual Eviction and Exit report data: eviction rate and unlawful detainers continue to decrease.
 - 2021 reflects impacts of COVID-19 policies in FY2020-21

Key Eviction Prevention Strategies

- ■Wage equity investments set base hourly wages for:
 - Case managers (\$28)
 - Property management: desk clerk (\$22), janitors (\$23), maintenance (\$25)
- ■Investment in lower case management ratios at PSH sites:
 - 1:25 for adults
 - 1:20 for families and youth.
- Housing placement team: transfers, reasonable accommodations.
- Partnerships to support high-acuity tenants:
 - Dept. Of Disability and Aging Services: In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS)
 - **Department of Public Health:** Permanent Housing Advanced Clinical Services (PHACS), nursing, overdose prevention
 - Adult Probation: Home Safe (support for older adults/people with disabilities)



Key Eviction Prevention Strategies

- Addressing challenges with paying rent:
 - Rent capped at 30% of income across the PSH portfolio.
 - HSH published guidelines for providers on how to handle non-payment of rent based on national best practices.
 - Goal to support tenants to remain in compliance with rent payment provisions of their lease to remain stably housed.
 - Provides guidance on how tenants, case managers and property managers can support this goal from referral to ongoing support onsite.
 - ERAP prevention funds used to support PSH tenants during COVID-19 rent relief phase: assisted **2,001** tenants with **~\$4 million**.



Homelessness Prevention: Program Overview

- ERAP is San Francisco's main prevention program jointly administered by HSH and MOHCD.
- Since June 2021, the program has disbursed approximately \$51 million to over 7,000 households.

Spring 2021

SF ERAP launches as a COVID-19 rent relief program to support people who could not get help from the State's program.

September 2022

Application portal temporarily closes to process backlog.

In FY2021 – 22, HSH's providers disbursed \$4.7 in ERAP funding.

State program closes; SF ERAP expands eligibility.

April 2022

Portal reopens as a "steady state" program with narrower eligibility criteria.

February 2023

- Snapshot as of May 30, 2023.

Program Updates: Shelter

Community Shelter Reservations:

- Pilot for community referrals will roll out in July 2023 unhoused people can sign up for the waitlist via phone or a web form.
- → Hotel vouchers for youth and survivors of violence will launch in June.

∽Pier 94:

- Site not suitable for long-term residential inhabitants.
- HSH will wind down site by end of calendar year (like SIP process).
- Working to find a new site for the trailers.

∽Mission Cabins:

Provider solicitation of information <u>posted</u> (due June 9).





Additional Updates

Overdose Prevention

→HSH's overdose prevention policy:

- Affirms the Department's commitment to Housing First and harm reduction and requires providers to adopt harm reduction models.
- Requires providers to post informational materials about substance use treatment, naloxone, syringes, an overdose prevention and make referrals as applicable.
- Requires providers to have an onsite overdose response policy.
- Requires designated Department and provider staff to take an annual training on overdose prevention and harm reduction.
- **→**Compliance checked through annual program monitoring.
- ←As of June 1, 2023, all providers are required to use online Critical Incident Report (CIR) form, which will enable HSH to better track overdoses.



Housing and Resources for LGBTQ+

- → Demographics for people enrolled in CE <u>available on HSH website</u>:
 - First quarter of 2023: 137 TGNC clients (4%) and 574 LGBQ+ clients (13%)
- ► Key LGBTQ+-focused resources:
 - Taimon Booton Navigation Center for TGNC people (community referrals)
 - Jazzie's Place shelter (community referrals)
 - Two LGBTQ+-focused youth Coordinated Entry Access Points
 - Initiative to end transgender homelessness: 150 scattered-site units, new site-based PSH, and ongoing general fund investments in services.

State Legislative Update

Governor's Revised 2023-24 Budget:

Addresses homelessness by:

- Creating mechanisms for local efforts to address homelessness.
- Increasing regional coordination on homelessness solutions.
- Holding local governments accountable for achieving outcomes related to accessing housing and remaining stably housed.

Incl. \$1 billion of one-time General Fund for Homeless Housing, Assistance & Prevention Program (HHAP):

- Focus on highest priority needs, including unsheltered homelessness.
- Prioritized spending on supporting permanent housing and activities such as Homekey; no additional Homekey funds.

State Legislation Supported by HSH

- SB 657 (Caballero): Homelessness Services Staff Training
- SB 37 (Caballero): Older Adult Subsidies
- AB 441 (Haney): Monthly Tax Distributions
- AB 1085 (Maienschein): Medi-Cal Housing Support Services



Chief Equity Officer Update

- ► Completed Building Equity: Addressing Interpersonal Racism sessions:
 - Series 2 of the HSH Racial Equity Training Series
 - 9 in-person sessions with 195 staff trained.
