





Coordinated Entry Assessments








Coordinated Entry & Housing Demographics







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Households Moved into Housing by Fiscal Year: Race & Ethnicity


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
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Households Moved into Housing by Fiscal Year: Sexual Orientation and Gender


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
Coordinated Entry & Housing Demographics: Age

Program Updates: Coordinated Entry



HSH staff and providers at the Project Homeless Connect event on Sept. 27, 2023.

► Research and development underway for a Coordinated Entry assessment specific for survivors of domestic violence.

- ► Coordinated Entry participated in the Project Homeless Connect event on Sept. 27 at Bill Graham:
 - Coordinated Entry served 145 people.
 - Dolores Street, Episcopal Community Services, Catholic Charities and LYRIC participated.

Project Homeless Connect success story: One client staying on the streets was reinstated to the housing queue and received an emergency shelter placement.



Program Updates: Coordinated Entry

The Multi-disciplinary Team worked at the Sanctuary in September:

- ► Increased number of Problem Solving guests by 25% and number of Housing Referral Status guests by 14%.
- ←Enrolled five guests in SSI / SSDI advocacy through the Housing Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP).
- ► 18 guests met with HSA for social supports.
- ►2 guests enrolled in Home Safe for nursing-supported housing.

Client Success Story: Sam* was one of the top five users of a local hospital's emergency department. He has a traumatic brain injury from an injury while living outside. He was enrolled in the **HDAP program**, which provides a social worker and attorney to help with **SSI / SSDI application process**. Sam moved into housing within two months and has had **no emergency department visits**.










Housing Inventory Dashboard

Program Update: Housing Placements

Strategies to Reduce Vacancies:

- ► Full implementation of unit-level inventory, leading to faster, more targeted placements.
- ► Expanding Continuum of Care (CoC) selfcertification and pre-vetting.
- ► Targeted referral management with the San Francisco Housing Authority
- ◆ Targeting 4 high-vacancy buildings: 140 vacancies; goal to reduce by half by Dec. 1.


With these steps, we anticipate at least 93% occupancy rate by Feb. 2024.




Housing Vacancies

Program Updates: Housing

- ← City Gardens Family Supportive Housing: Lease-up completed in October.
 - Reached Homekey lease-up deadline Thank you to Abode/HIP and HSH staff!
- → Providers selected for 112 of the 150 scattered-site supportive housing subsidies dedicated to the Ending Transgender Homelessness initiative:
 - 50 Flexible Housing Subsidy Pool slots for TGI Justice Project
 - 62 Flexible Housing Subsidy Pool slots for Community Forward SF
- ► <u>Solicitation of Interest issued in late October</u> for property management and supportive services at a new youth supportive housing site.
- **Emergency Housing Vouchers** issuance and housing move-ins continue:
 - 677 households moved in as of Oct. 19.



HSH Shelter Inventory

- Snapshot as of October 24, 2023.
- <u>Public dashboard</u> available on HSH website; refreshes daily Monday – Friday.
- Ability to filter to drill down on specific programs and populations served.



Program Updates: Shelter

- →Hotel vouchers: Program for survivors of domestic violence had a soft launch in October – referral partners will expand over the next month.
- ← Held input session on 10/25 with family shelter and access point providers on improving family shelter access and referrals.
- → Re-launched the **Oasis Family Shelter** in partnership with St. Anthony's and Providence Foundation.

Adult Shelter Reservation Waitlist

Preliminary Data: Oct. 1 - 20

- Average daily beds available: 20
- Average # people on waitlist: **350**

Updates to the system:

- Increase ratio of people called per available bed from 1:1 to 4:1.
- Fill "**leftover**" beds from down the list.
- Controller's Office evaluation started.



Program Updates: Shelter

Shelter Capacity Updates:

- Returning congregate shelter capacity at four sites to full capacity to prepare for additional placements this winter.
- → Already added 17 beds at the Bayview Navigation Center in August 2023.
- Planned expansion of 61 additional beds at Dolores Adult Shelter in spring 2024.
- Interfaith Winter Shelter will open on November 10:
 - Overnight-only shelter at rotating churches, operated by Episcopal Community Services.
 - Locations: Canon Kip Senior Center, St. Mary's Cathedral, St. Mark's Cathedral, First Unitarian Universalist.

2023 State Legislation Wrap-Up

October 14: Last day for Gov. Newsom to approve/veto legislation.

Bill Name	Description	Status	
Bills HSH Supported at the San Francisco State Legislative Committee			
AB 1085: Medi-Cal Housing Support Services (Maienschien)	Requires state to seek federal approval to make housing support services a Medi-Cal benefit, rather than an option for individual plans.	Governor vetoed , citing fiscal impact.	
AB-441: Earned Income Tax Credit – Periodic Payments (Haney)	Advance monthly payments for CalEITC and other child-related tax credits.	Gutted and amended – now about food markets.	
SB-657: Staff Training for Serving Older Adults (Caballero)	Require the Interagency Council on Homelessness to coordinate to provide gerontological training for homelessness services staff.	Governor vetoed , citing duplicative efforts.	
SB-37: Subsidies for Older Adults and Adults with Disabilities (Caballero)	Establish a multi-year Rent Stabilization Fund to provide a mix of shallow and deep subsidies to help older adults and people with disabilities afford fair market rate rent and transition to permanent housing assistance programs.	Held in Senate committee.	



2023 State Legislation Wrap-Up

Bill Name	Description	Status	
Other Bills Related to Homelessness			
SB-567: Termination of tenancy (Durazo)	Protects tenants statewide against illegal evictions by closing loopholes in existing tenant protection laws and adding enforcement mechanisms.	Approved.	
SB-91: CEQA exemptions for supportive housing conversions (<i>Umberg</i>)	Indefinitely exempts projects converting a motel or hotel to supportive or transitional housing from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).	Approved.	
SB-326 (Eggman) & AB- 531 (Irwin): Updating and expanding behavioral health services.	SB-326 refocuses existing funds and reframes the Mental Health Services Act as the Behavioral Health Services Act; expand it to include treatment of substance use disorders. AB-531 creates a \$6.38 billion bond to build over 11,150 new treatment beds and supportive housing units, as well as increase outpatient capacity to serve over 26,000 people annually.	Approved. Will go before voters on March 5, 2024 as Prop. 1.	



Equity Office Updates

• Staff trainings:

- Third series of HSH's racial equity staff training took place in September and October 2023 with approximately 150 staff trained.
- Monthly new employee equity orientations started in October 2023.
- Ending Trans Homelessness initiative:
 - Affirming Trans Access to Housing training first session on November 20, 2023.
 - Sessions offered for HSH provider partners.
 - Monthly sessions through March with over 250 signups as of Oct. 2023.



Updates from other Advisory Bodies

→Local Homeless Coordinating Board:

- Four open seats on LHCB; nominations active.
- CoC application submitted on September 28.

→Shelter Monitoring Committee:

- Three vacant seats; nominations active.
- Continued work with HSH on updates to the standards of care administrative code.

→ Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee:

- All meetings now in person, with next meeting on Dec. 12 from 2:00 p.m. 4:00 p.m.
- 5 vacant seats on the committee of 15 total; nominations active.



Mayor's Mid-Year Budget Reduction Instructions

Targets for **General Fund reductions** issued on Oct. 11; HSH asked to propose a **\$8.4 million reduction**.

- Eliminate vacant positions; reduce non-essential employee travel.
- Deactivate unused IT licenses and equipment.
- Identify estimated spend rate for current contracts; grantees with underspending may have grant funds reallocated to other programs.
- Propose reductions to non-essential or underperforming agreements.

HSH is focused on maintaining existing programs and staffing while working to meet our budget targets.
